Subject: Fisheries Management Plans

Summary:

This paper provides Members with an overview of DEFRA's Fisheries Management Plan – FMP 'Programme' and an update as to the progress made to progress the first five plans that were published in December 2024. It is expected that the next round of FMPs will be published by the end of 2025.



Background

The Fisheries Act 2020 provides the framework to manage our fisheries as an independent coastal state outside of the EU Common Fisheries Policy. Fisheries Management Plans (FMPs) are a requirement of the Act, the UK Joint Fisheries Statement, and a commitment in the England Environmental Improvement Plan 2023.

Fisheries policy authorities (Defra, and the devolved administrations) have been tasked to develop and then publish forty-three FMPs of which fifteen are focused on English fisheries. On the 14 December 2023 the first five FMP were published, followed in October 2024 by the final FMP of the first tranche of 'frontrunner' FMPs. Of the remaining nine FMPs, five are due to be published by the end of 2025 with the remaining four published in 2026. As the last four FMPs are either located outside our district or are addressing more marginal fisheries, by the end of 2025 we will have a clear idea of the objectives and the key delivery FMP actions for all our key fish stocks in our district. With so many different FMPs and a large number of actions coming from each FMP the next

task will be to integrate our KEIFCA priorities and objectives within this framework.



Working within the new FMP framework

Working within a much clearer national framework will help regional inshore management work in conjunction with offshore measures, however, this does mean that effort and resource need to be spent attending and inputting into national FMP working groups. Of the six published FMPs, four (Bass, Whelk, King Scallop and Crab and Lobster) have set up working groups to support the development of the FMP.

The groups bring together stakeholders to collaborate, share knowledge and ideas, and to help shape the goals and proposals with some FMPs also having separate implementation groups or scientific sub-groups. Membership varies, but can include commercial and recreational fishermen, scientists, and environmentalists. The bass and king scallop groups are chaired by Defra and the crab and lobster and whelk groups are chaired by Seafish. The number of meetings per working group does vary but most groups meet at least 2-3 times a year, However some sub-groups like the bass task and finfish group have had meeting every two weeks and meetings of the whelk management group including day long meetings in London and intensive series of meetings one per week for three weeks arranged to work through a detailed options paper. Keeping up to date with the progress made by each group is challenging and so different IFCAs, lead on different FMPs (generally an FMP of an important species

in their district: - KEIFCA lead on the Whelk FMP and our lead enforcement officer has sat on a bass authorisations task and finish group).


Whilst the management groups play a role in progressing FMP delivery the FMP 'programme' and its delivery is managed by DEFRA. Under the FMP 'programme' there is a management structure that reports on the progress, design and publication of new FMPs, the implementation of published FMPs and the actions being taken to communicate progress and engage stakeholders. All these groups report to the FMP Project Board and using this feedback the board then provides strategic oversight and assigns resource. The Association of IFCAs sits on all these groups and acts as a link to ensure that the needs and priorities of IFCAs and inshore stakeholder are represented and heard.


FMP Programme Board	At the head of our governance structure is the Board which provides direction, oversight, and accountability. It gives long-term strategic leadership and makes decisions around the prioritisation of work and resources to ensure that the programme delivers high-quality FMPs. It also makes sure that the work being done is aligned within the Defra group and helps us to manage any potential risks and issues.
Programme Management Group	This group reports on the progress of FMP development and supports the design and publication of plans through lessons learned and risk management. Members include Defra policy teams, delivery partners and experts from MMO, Cefas, AIFCA and Seafish, JNCC and Natural England as well as ICF who is evaluating the programme.
Implementation Delivery Group	This group, with members from Defra, MMO and AIFCA, tracks the delivery of the goals in the published FMPs and identifies and acts on any barriers to make sure things are moving on as planned.
Engagement and Communications Group	This group brings together people responsible for FMP engagement and communications from across Defra's policy teams and delivery partners. The group works to coordinate activities across the projects in the programme and takes a long-term approach to planning.

Delivering FMP actions

Delivering so many tasks across a wide range of FMPs is challenging, however progress has been made and the graphics below, from August this year, outline some of the tasks that have been completed or are undergoing in each FMP. IFCAs will continue to work closely with DEFRA to deliver key FMP objectives and the actions, and it is hoped that upcoming FMP implementation meetings with DEFRA will help coordinate efforts and integrate delivery between DEFRA, the MMO and IFCAs.

England Updates

Defra have set up a Bass Management Group (BMG) to facilitate stakeholder participation in management decisions.

4 2025

Defra are conducting a review into shore-based netting in England as a key part of goal seven in the Bass FMP.

Having engaged with a wide variety of stakeholders and subject matter experts, a report has now been drafted and will soon be brought to the BMG.

6 2025

As part of FMP goal four, the MMO and Defra have reviewed the bass guidance pages on the gov.uk website to improve communications with commercial fishermen and recreational anglers on the regulations around bass fishing.

Consolidating stakeholder feedback and authorisation group priorities into recommendations which are due to be delivered to Defra later this year.


5 2025
